The Race for Your Dashboard *(Finally, Your Car's Brain Might Be Smarter Than Your Toaster)*

The competition for your dashboard is accelerating. As automakers race toward smarter, more unified infotainment systems, Apple and Google are pushing their platforms—CarPlay Ultra and Android Auto 14.3—closer to becoming the default operating systems for your car. While Apple's CarPlay Ultra currently leads in integration and polish, Android Auto is evolving rapidly. Both platforms signal a shift toward standardized digital experiences across vehicles, which could finally put an end to cryptic car menus and inconsistent interfaces.

One Interface to Rule Them All

"CarPlay Ultra's" most ambitious feature is its full-vehicle integration. It's not just your central infotainment screen anymore. It extends to the instrument cluster, climate controls and even seat settings. The goal: a consistent, intuitive experience that doesn't require relearning the dashboard every time you switch cars. Instead of deciphering yet another quirky icon for defrost, you'll interact with an interface that feels familiar—especially for iPhone users. Apple is



betting that a unified, aesthetically refined interface can win over drivers and automakers alike.

Who's On Board?

As of mid-May 2025, CarPlay Ultra's roll-out is still limited, but momentum is growing. Automakers increasingly recognize that high-quality software experiences are just as important as horsepower or handling. Aston Martin, Porsche and Polestar are early adopters, signaling luxury and EV brands see value in offering seamless integration with the Apple ecosystem. Expect this list to expand as customer demand for consistent, user-friendly interfaces grows.

The Showdown: "CarPlay Ultra" vs. "Android Auto" 14.3

The in-car tech battle mirrors the smartphone wars—Apple vs. Google. CarPlay Ultra is pushing for full-system integration, while Android Auto, for now,

remains largely focused on the main infotainment screen. But Android Auto 14.3 isn't far behind. Google's platform is evolving with better voice assistance, smarter navigation and growing support from automakers. The real difference may come down to ecosystems: iPhone users will lean

Apple; Android users, naturally, will favor Google.

Going Solo: Automakers Saying "No Thanks"

Some companies are choosing a different path. General Motors and Stellantis have announced plans to phase out CarPlay and Android Auto in future EVs, citing a desire to control the user experience and collect in-house data. Whether drivers will embrace these proprietary systems remains uncertain. The gamble is that consumers will accept a less familiar interface in exchange for tighter integration and features tailored to each brand. But the risk is alienating customers who expect their phones to simply work with their vehicles.

Jaguar at a Crossroads

Jaguar's position remains ambiguous. The brand has been relatively quiet on

whether it will embrace CarPlay Ultra or Android Auto's latest features. That silence is notable as Jaguar attempts a broader reinvention. For a company known for heritage and elegance, modernizing its digital experience could be a meaningful step toward relevance. Embracing a polished, proven infotainment system might be the simplest way to elevate user experience while appealing to a younger, tech-savvy audience. With competitors like Genesis and Hyundai

moving decisively in this direction, Jaguar has an opportunity to leap forward—if it chooses to act.

Wrapping UP: A Glimpse of What's Next

CarPlay Ultra represents more than just Apple branding in your car—it's a signal that automotive software is growing up. By creating a familiar, consistent interface across brands and models, Apple is setting a high bar. Android Auto is pushing to meet it, and

together they're reshaping expectations for what an in-car system should be. While some manufacturers are opting out, the tide seems to be turning toward standardized, user-first design. If the dream of cars that "just work" like our phones becomes reality, the days of laggy touchscreens and baffling menu trees may finally be behind us. In the meantime, may your infotainment be fast, your GPS accurate and your coffee shop always just one voice command away. £

Report on the JCNA AGM from our Delegates (Tim and Mandy)

It was my pleasure, and privilege, along with my wife, to represent our NW JOCO chapter at this year's AGM in picturesque Valley Forge near Pittsburgh, PA. This is our third time and third year in succession to represent our club at an AGM.

The event kicked off on Friday April 25th with a morning drive. There were 6 groups of cars lined up and for us "out-of-towners", they paired us up with local members. This was to be a 45-mile Covered Bridge Tour, through the rolling hillsides of Chester County, PA, a picturesque slice of William Penn's 45,000 square-mile land grant from the King of England. We were privileged to be paired with Becca Payonk and her luxurious XJ6 with all modern comforts, including A/C on this beautiful day. We followed her husband in the 1960 Mark IX, what a fabulous car! We meandered around the cars lined up, with all models and years represented. Please look at the fabulous pictures my wife took. What a brilliant idea to start a Jag event with a drive through the countryside including covered bridges, acres of green space with horses, cows and the occasional deer.

We finished the 90-minute drive at a wonderful restaurant that had opened up just for our private event, called the Stables, Kitchen and Beer Garden. The restaurant had both outside and inside seating and we were able to mingle with the tour participants/delegates



from all over the country. Its true as they say, we get together for the cars and stay because of the people!

After a casual drive back to the hotel and a break in the schedule, we boarded buses for the famous Simeone Foundation Automotive Museum. This collection of seventy-five historically significant racing cars was assembled over fifty years by Dr. Fred Simeone and includes foreign and domestic vehicles produced between 1908 and 1970. Dinner, served at the museum was "A Taste of Philly" that includes a

The uniqueness of the exhibition was how they had the cars placed in period. He is also used to judge cars before they are judged, to ensure cars are prepped to their very best. The tips on the different types and uses of treatments from dry ice to the

new ceramic coatings was discussed.

After a cocktail reception we sat for dinner and the guest speaker was Brandon Baldassari from Jaguar Cars. He was an extremely knowledgeable and true brand ambassador for the next generation of Jaguar cars. Although I am still a "petrol-head and have not embraced electric or EV cars, this presentation was very entertaining and enlightening. It also spelled out a promising future for the Jag brand, although it is all electrification only.

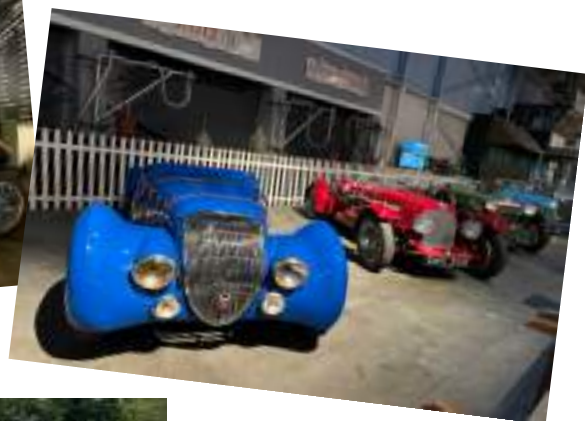

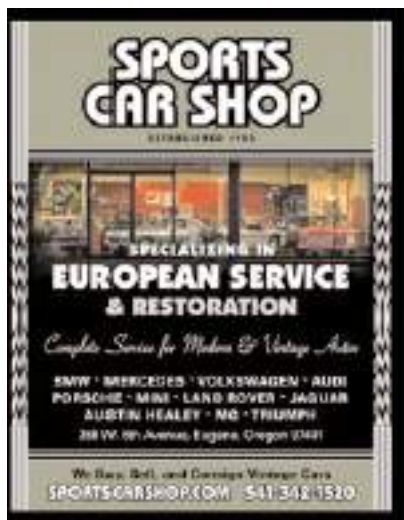
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From the editor's desk:

The Agony and the Ecstasy

The title is a bit dramatic for just a couple of local car shows but I thought it was rather catchy and am glad I thought of it... hmm. I went to a couple of local show and shines this last month and am reporting back on what I experienced. The first was the Portland Transmission Warehouse car show in SE Portland. It has been going on for about 40 years now. Officially it starts at 7 A.M. but cars start arriving as early as 5 to get a favorite parking spot. At 7 you can come in and register, get a number to put on your headlight and pick up free coffee and cookies. The number is for the judges to use if you should get an award. There are judging teams that go out and pick the winners from the blocks and blocks of cars-700 to 900 of them when the weather is good. They give awards for the usual hot rod stuff like "Best Flames" and "Most Chrome" but for many other things too and they don't leave out the European makes either. One year I was on the team judging military vehicles and there were sixteen of them!

I guess because they start so early in the morning that's why they fire up the BBQ's about 10 A.M. and start cooking up some very good hot dogs again, they are free for participants. All the roads are full of cars parked on both sides and the streets are full of people. It is a really relaxed show with something for everyone and always something you have never seen. By noon everyone has gone home.

The second show I went to was in a small town south of Portland and as my comments are mostly not positive, I'm going to not mention a name. This show was scheduled to start at 10 A.M. but knowing the lingo I showed up at 9. They had no signs up of any kind. I could not find where to register or where to park.
